What is poetry?

Poem can be about anything - a thought, an emotion or a story.
Poems can rhyme, use alliteration or rhythm but they don't have to.

Key Vocabulary

Rhyme	Words with similar sounding final syllables
Rhythm	Patterns that make things easier to remember.
Repetition	Words or phrases that are said or displayed multiple times
Syllable	The beats of words. Breaking words into smaller parts helps us to spell.

What is rhyming?

Words that rhyme have the same sound.
For example, 'Cheese' and 'peas' are words that both have the same sound.
You can write rhyming poems by using pairs or groups of words that use the same sounds.

What is rhythm?

Rhythm in poetry can be thought of as the beat or the flow of a poem. It is made up of beat and repetition, so it usually refers to features of sound. It is created by stressed and unstressed syllables in a line or a verse.

What is repetition?

Repetition is when a certain word, sentence or phrase is written more than once in a poem.
Repetition is used in poetry and prose to help make the writing more interesting and to help create patterns. Depending on the word or phrase that is repeated, repetition allows for more emphasis to be placed on certain themes, ideas or objects.
