<p>I know that saying the word walk on gives an instruction to the horse to slowly start moving forward.</p>
<p>I know that before I can ride a horse I need to ensure that I am mounting the horse correctly. This involves ensuring that all equipment is checked before use and that I am listening to the instructor. This is also important when dismounting a horse.</p>
<p>I know that stable management refers to the day-to-day care and maintenance of horses. I know I will help with keeping their living environment clean and comfortable.</p>
<p>I know that it is important that I help support feeding and watering a horse during stable management. This involves providing the horse with a balanced diet and constant access to clean water to maintain its health.</p>
<p>I know that a correct sitting position ensures that the rider is secure, comfortable, and able to apply aids (leg, rein, and seat) effectively without disrupting the horse's movement.</p>
